For most research degree students, writing a large academic thesis will be a new experience, and they may benefit from the resources set out in this leaflet. The skills involved in writing and communicating can often be obtained through submission of work for comment and review, but specific courses, workshops or one-to-one sessions can help in a more targeted and efficient way.

The Graduate School, along with other areas of the University, provides a host of opportunities for research students to learn how to write and communicate effectively.

Some of these sessions are aimed at non-native speakers, but most are suitable for any student. Supervisors may wish to refer their students to specific courses and include such development in the students' personal development plan and general research training record.

ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE

• In-Sessional English (ISE)

Our ISE programme is open to all undergraduate and postgraduate students. ISE offers a range of short modules available in both teaching blocks. **port.ac.uk/in-sessional-english**

GRADUATE SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (GSDP) SESSIONS

Many of the GSDP sessions directly or indirectly address writing and communication skills. See the GSDP brochure for more information at **port.ac.uk/graduate-school-moodle**.

• Academic reading and writing skills

These sessions explore different approaches to critical reading and writing and finding your own voice in relation to the literature. Small special interest groups also meet regularly to improve their reading or writing skills with the support of an academic tutor.

• Writing and revising your thesis

Sessions include planning and structuring a thesis, literature review, how to write and argue persuasively in your thesis, and how to think, plan and talk about your research.

Presentation skills

In addition to a session on general presentation skills, sessions in this area include those on writing a conference abstract, producing presentations using software packages, and preparing effective posters.

• Writing for publication and dissemination

These courses focus on how to: write your research for publication, get published in print and on the web, and promote your research widely.
